## Interview with the E15 Area Director

## Why did you put your hand up to be Area Director?

I thought it was important to have someone in the role who would act as a coordinator for the E15 clubs, particularly to help clubs with organising judges for club contests. I had an idea of how it could be done, based on my experience of organising Kew's club contests in 2019, so I thought that I could do it.

## What does an Area Director do?

The E15 Area Director liaises between clubs in the E15 Area and the District 73 leadership team. As E15 Area Director I attend meetings with the Eastern Division Director and other Area Directors in Eastern Division, as well as some meetings of all the District 73 leadership team. Area Directors receive many updates about District events such as training sessions, which they pass on to club leaders.

Area Directors also visit the clubs in their Area at least twice a year and submit club visit reports which are read by the District leadership team. In this way, the District leadership is kept in touch with the issues currently affecting clubs and can respond appropriately. For example, if clubs request more training about how to use Social Media effectively to attract new members, District 73 will then respond by running training sessions focused on this issue.

The Area Director is also responsible for organising Area Council meetings, the Area Contest and assisting with the organisation of the Division's Club Officer Training sessions.

### What has been the most surprising thing about being AD?

My first ten weeks as Area Director have felt like my first swimming lesson, when I jumped into the deep end of a pool... On that occasion I was fished out by the teacher using a large pole! As an Area Director I've found guidance from D73 training sessions, and my peers Noel McDonald (E14 Area Director) and Jo Evans (M22 Area Director).

It has still been a very steep learning curve and quite time consuming. I started late in the role (August rather than July) and quickly completed my first visit to all five clubs in E15 before club contests started. I've since attended eight club contests in E15, and an additional three contests outside of E15 to broaden my experience.

I'm surprised by how much I've learned and how I've been able to rise to the challenges of the role.

### Would you recommend it?

Yes, I would recommend taking on the role of Area Director. It's a great opportunity for personal development and to improve your leadership and communication skills. There are many people in District 73 who are inspirational role models, and many different styles of leadership to observe.
